Galleywood Heritage Centre, The Common

The Race Course Grandstand on The Common

The present Heritage Centre was originally the second and northern grandstand to be built on the Common in the 1920s, before the

Chelmsford Racing Company sold it and the land to The Chelmsford Rural District Council in 1939. It was then altered to become a depot for Chelmsford City Council maintenance and in 2008 Galleywood parishioners voted to save the Grandstand and use if for village amenity.

The newly named Heritage Centre is leased from Chelmsford City Council and is used by many for functions and by a variety of groups.

The Heritage Room is open weekly for people to investigate ancestry or an area of the village from local archives and holds monthly talks usually based on local history. There are many photos of the grandstand in use or in the

background of local activities. The Common is in regular use by villagers and passers-by and the Heritage Centre is used as a base for local walks.

Rous Cottage, The Common The Admiral Rous Inn.

The Inn was possibly on the site of a betting stand/small beer house in 1838 and was named after Admiral Rous in 1860.

The Admiral joined the navy aged 13 and worked his way up until retirement. Henry Rous was also a Senior Steward and probably stood by the betting stand to check on the races. Henry lived from 1795 to 1877.

The inn made national news in 1899 when the new landlord, Samuel Crozier apparently pushed his new wife, Cecilia down the spiral staircase. The locals testified that Samuel used to ill treat his wife. He was tried and found guilty and was the last person to be publicly hanged in Chelmsford on 5 December 1899.

The Horse and Groom Public House, Horse and Groom Lane Chelmsford Golf Club

Chelmsford Golf Club began in 1893 as a 9-hole course on Galleywood Common, with the first tee and the last hole situated on the green in front of the Horse & Groom public house.

A lean-to building to the left of the public house was added to serve as a clubhouse. The first President of the Golf Club was Lord Rayleigh and the Vice President was Arthur Balfour M.P. who later served as Prime Minister from 1902 to 1905.

Walter Maximilian de Zoete was a founder member of the club and he was the first Chairman of the newly formed Great Baddow Parish Council in 1894.

The Club still awards the de Zoete Cup each year.

The Club moved to Widford in 1912.

One of the original golf clubs is on display in the bar.

The Keene Hall, Watchouse Road

Lavinia Clarissa Stevens was born in Mile End in 1864 and in 1888 she married John Henry Keene. They lived in Leyton and then Carlton House, Galleywood. John died in Carlton House on 20 September 1931 and after his death, Lavinia erected numerous buildings in his memory including Keene homes in Broomfield Road, Chelmsford, for elderly people with housing need.

The Village Hall in Galleywood is called Keene Hall in her memory.

There is also a Keene Way in Galleywood.
